Essential to our collective work is the commitment to expand 40 Developmental Assets® and Developmental Relationships® training and resources for youth, families, and professionals to improve social-emotional health community-wide.

WHY DEVELOPMENTAL ASSETS

Data collected from Search Institute surveys of more than 5 million children and youth from all backgrounds and situations has demonstrated that the more Developmental Assets young people acquire, the better their chances of succeeding in school and becoming happy, healthy, and contributing members of their communities and society.

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
2019 YOUTH MASTER PLAN PROGRESS

SHINE ON POSTCARD CAMPAIGN

Shine On is our annual campaign we first launched in 2017 to celebrate United Nations International Youth Day. Each year student artists submit designs interpreting the theme “shine on” and four are selected for the printed postcards. To date, over 23,000 Shine On postcards have been distributed across the community thanks to our coalition partners and the public. In this year alone, social media posts on Facebook for Shine On reached over 9,000 people from July 8th to August 12th, 2019.

PURPOSE To increase access to and participation in high quality professional development opportunities relevant to youth serving organizations.

SPOTLIGHT PROJECT **CHILD & YOUTH CARE (CYC) CERTIFICATION CROSSWALK**
The state of Indiana is supporting the national credential, Child and Youth Care Certification (CYCC), for youth workers. CYD and professionals in the youth development field recognized an opportunity to connect Developmental Assets® with these emerging professional development practices. CYD secured funding to engage a consultant to develop a crosswalk that shows the connections between the CYC professional competencies and the 40 Developmental Assets. It is intended to provide well trained and certified child and youth workers the opportunity to integrate the Developmental Assets into their current and future work.
