




Serious disparities can be found throughout by place, race, income and immigrant status.






Compared to neighboring states, Indiana has the highest number of children who are in the foster care system.






The physical surroundings of where kids and families live have an impact.





14% of Indiana's households reported having at least one severe housing problem.








Family & Community Spotlight Child Maltreatment-The Impact

Neglect is the most common form of maltreatment.

What Solutions are Possible?





- ✓ Volunteer to be a CASA or foster parent.
- ✓ Establish reporting procedures for your organization to follow if child maltreatment is witnessed or suspected.
- ✓ Encourage **cross-sector collaboration** to address child maltreatment and support local families.


Although unemployment is low, many Hoosier families still face economic challenges.




Lack of access to sustaining income disproportionately impacts children of color




Access to high-quality education throughout a child's life is foundational to their success.





The high school graduation rate has been decreasing.














Variation exists among student demographics that enroll in college within a year of graduating from high school.



- ✓ Update school discipline practices to reflect on racial and ethnic disparities.
- ✓ Expand and coordinate social supports that allow children and youth to focus on learning in school.
- ✓ Develop systems to recruit and retain licensed guidance counselors and high qualified mental health providers.






Health Spotlight Contributors to Health and Well-Being

- 1 in 6 Hoosier children are food insured




Hispanic Hoosier children are the least likely to have health insurance.




Black infants are most likely to die before their first birthday.




