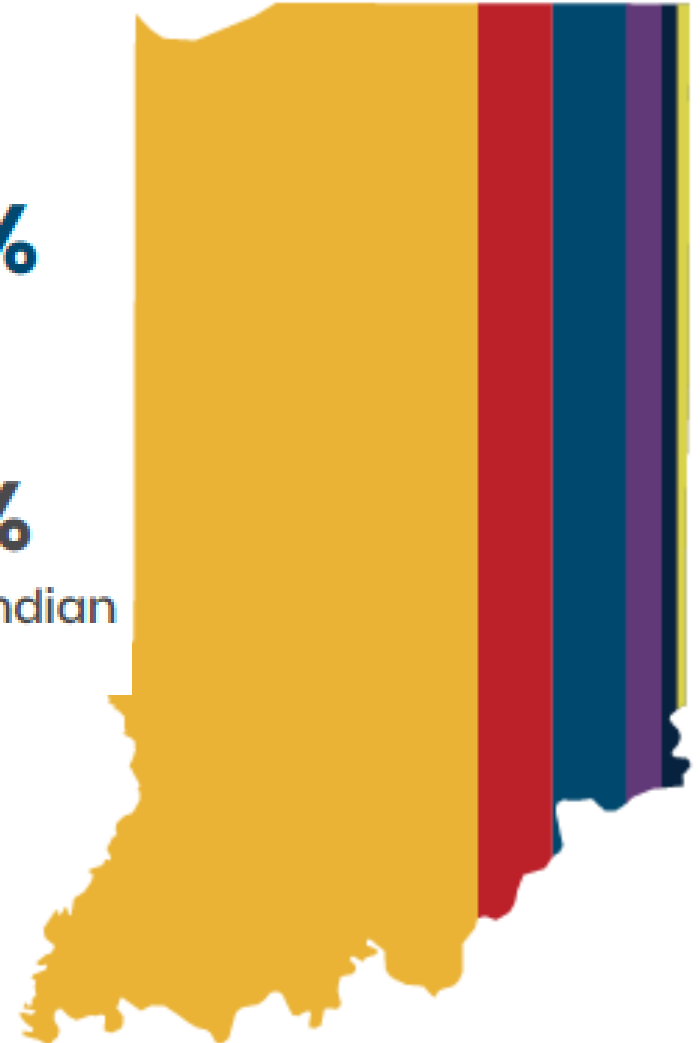

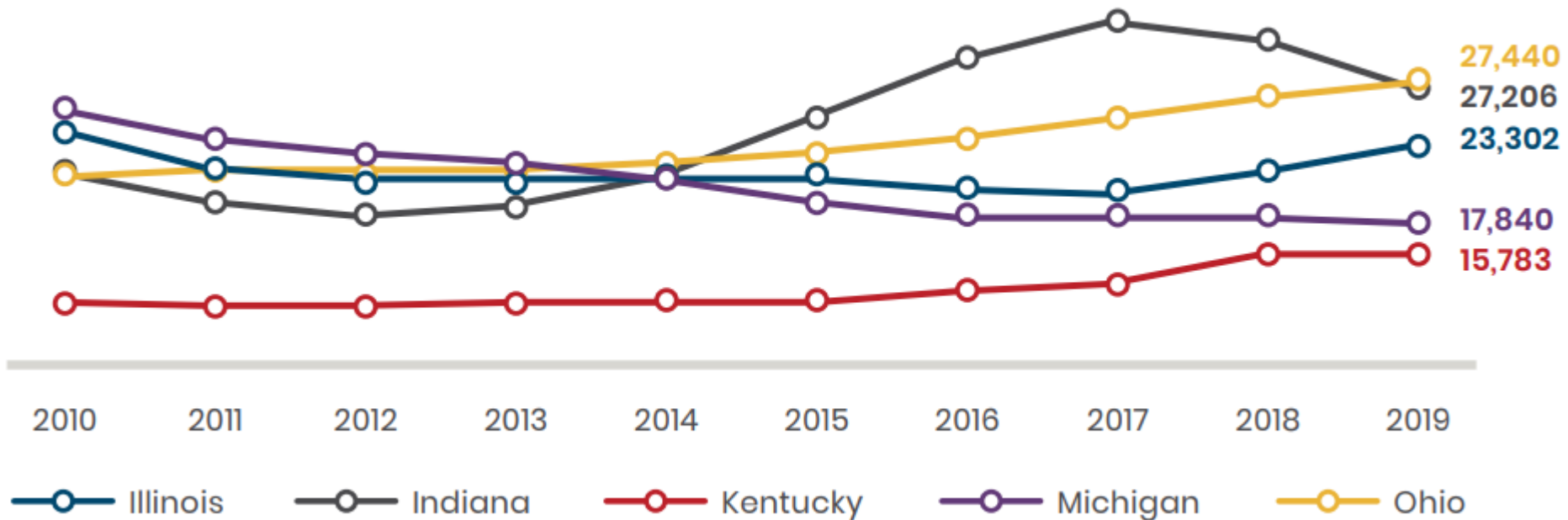

Number of Children in Foster Care System, Indiana and Neighboring States: 2010–2019



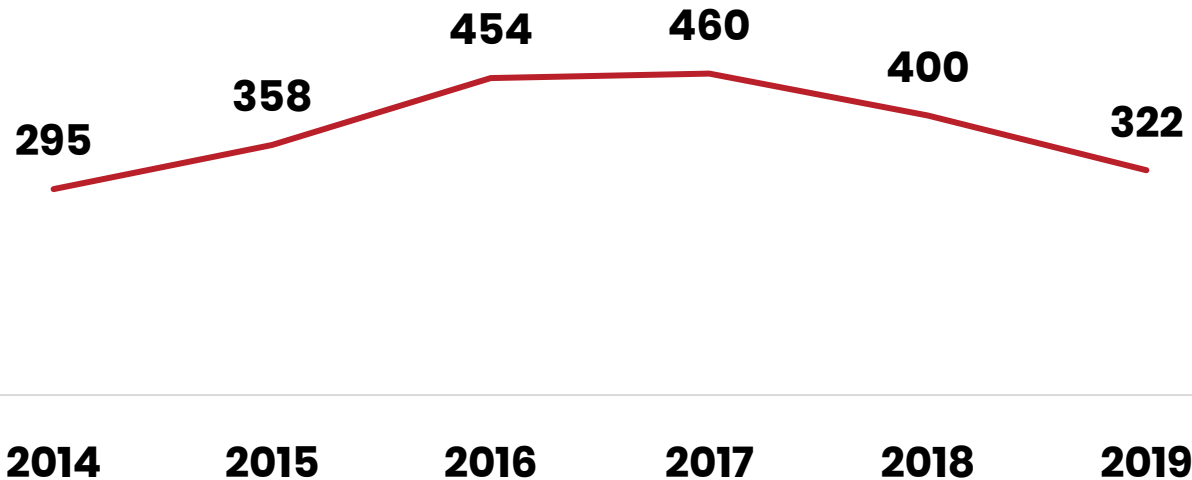

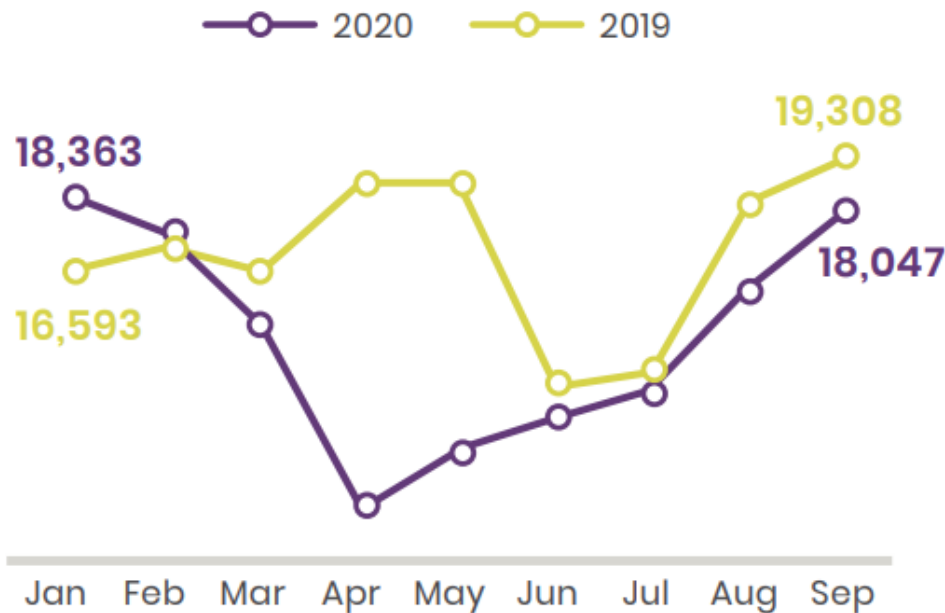
**Children with Active CHINS Involvements,  
Bartholomew County: State Fiscal Year 2014-2019**



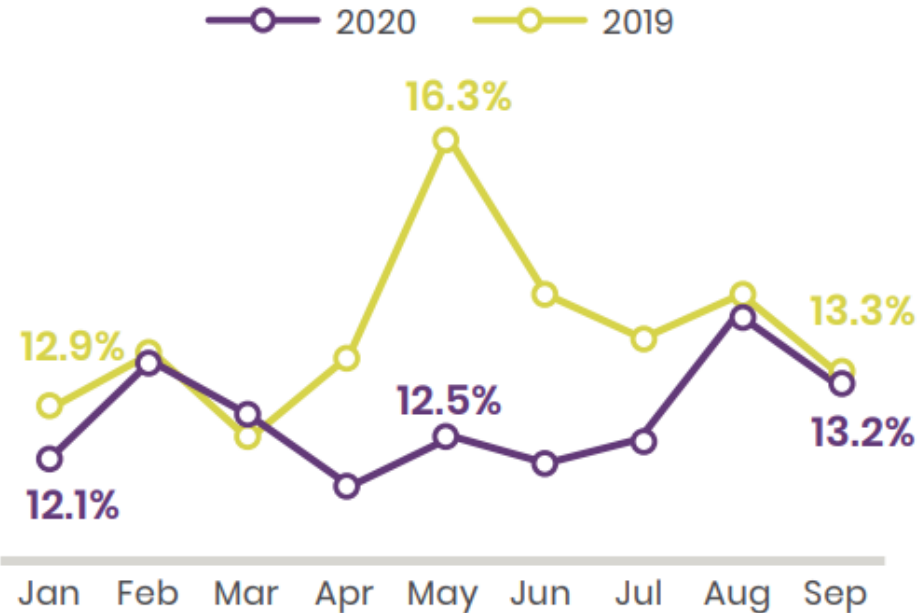

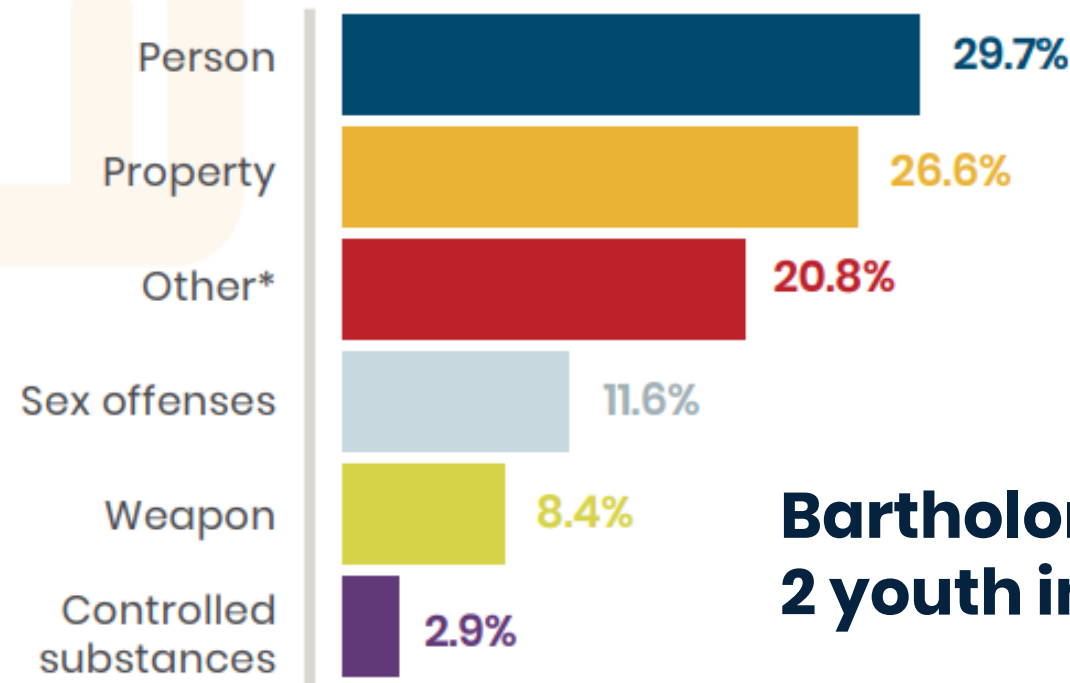

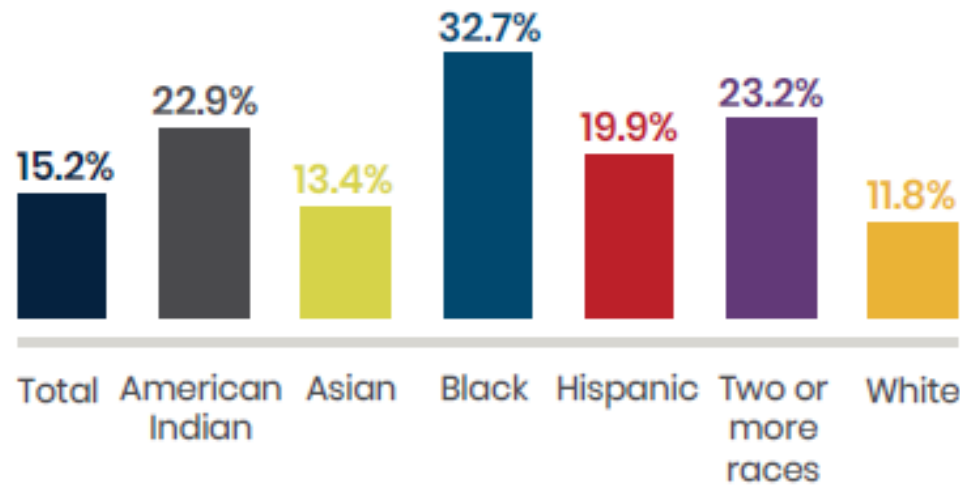




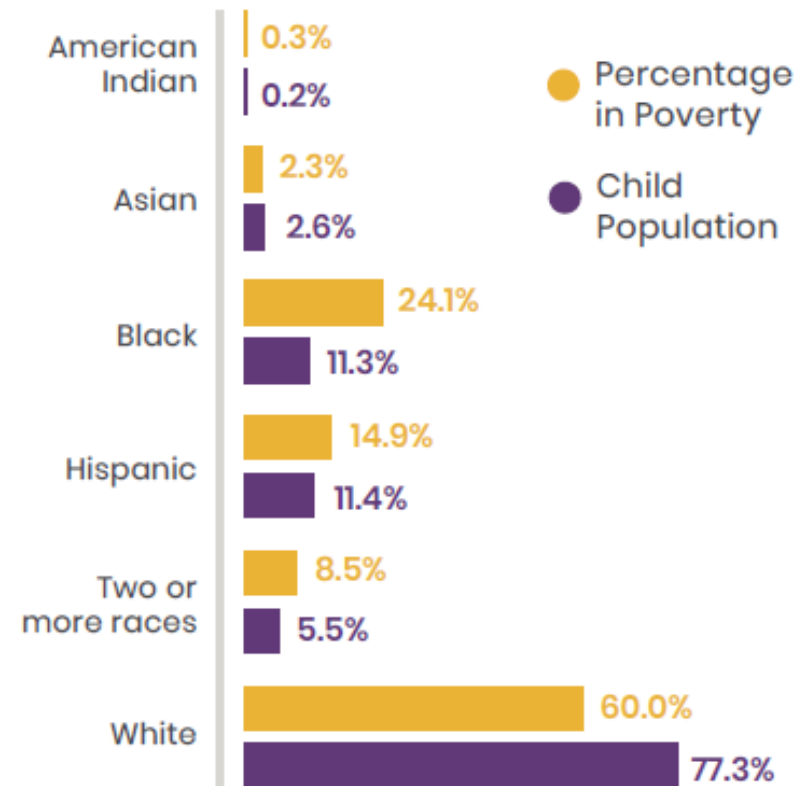

Percentage of Children in Poverty within Racial and Ethnic Subgroups, Indiana: 2019

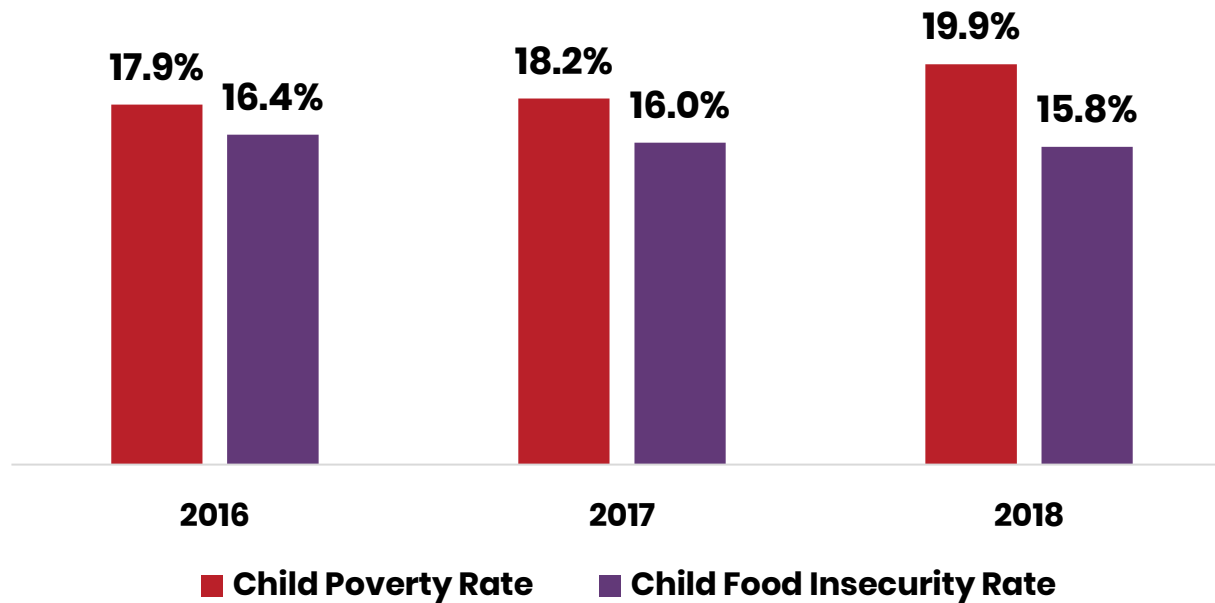

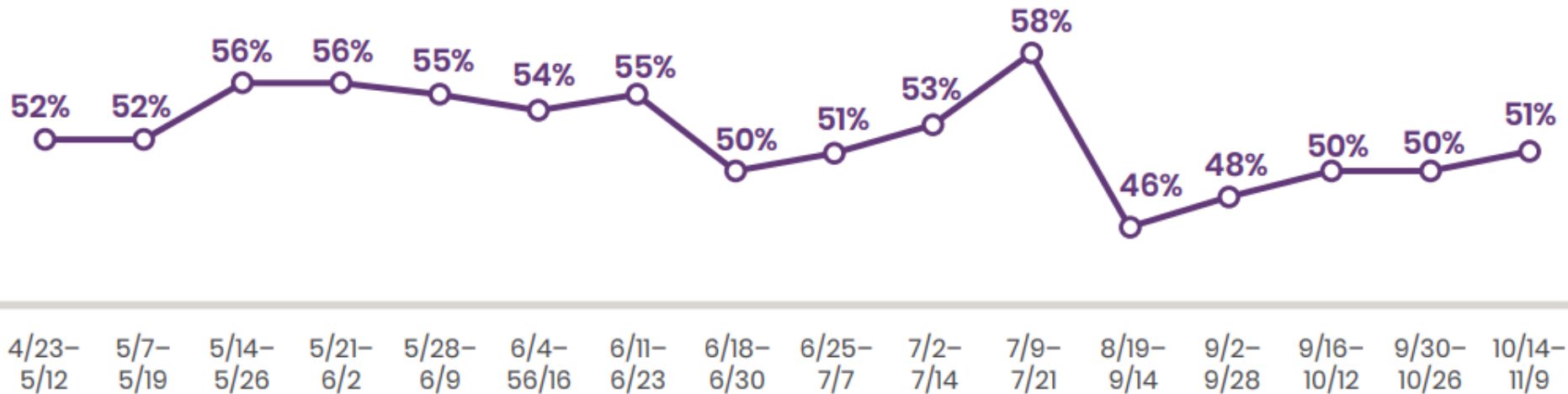


## Rates of Childhood Poverty and Food Insecurity, Bartholomew County: 2016–2018

Percentage of Adults Living in Households with Children Who Lost Employment Income, Indiana: April 23 – November 9, 2020



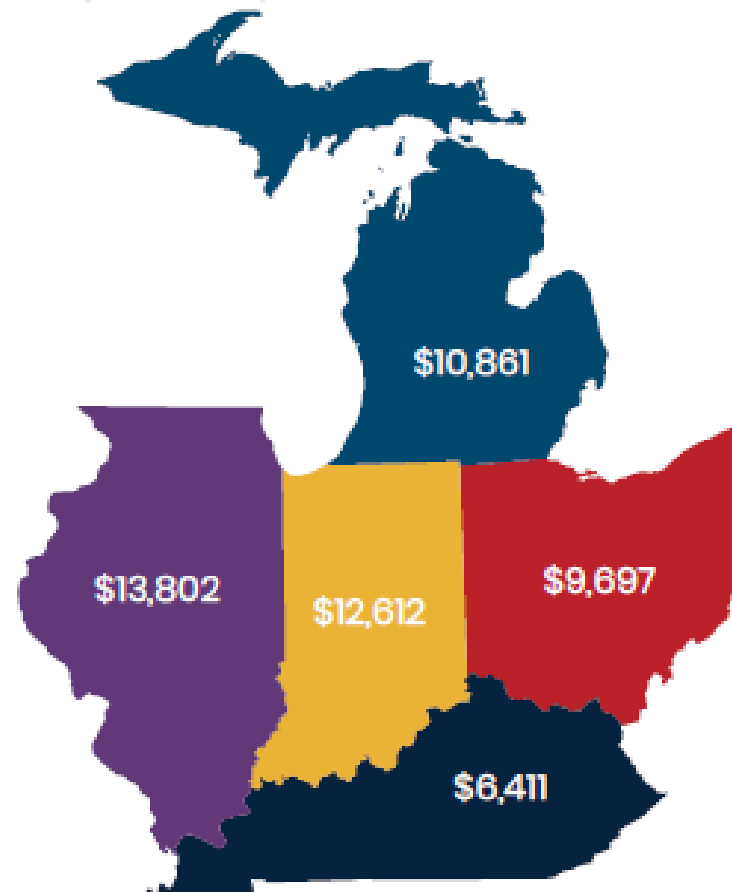

Neighboring States: 2020





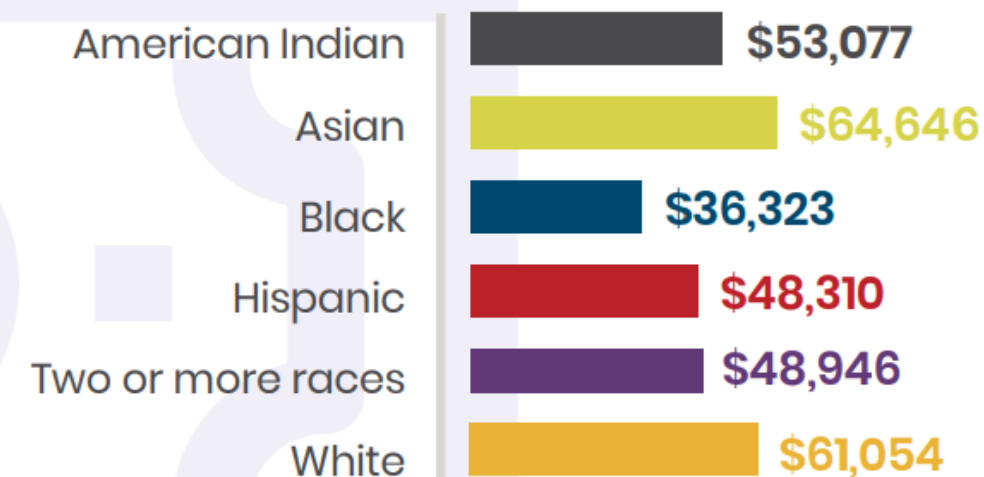


## SPOTLIGHT: Indiana's Wealth Gap

Median Income in the Past 12 Months by Race/Ethnicity, Indiana: 2019

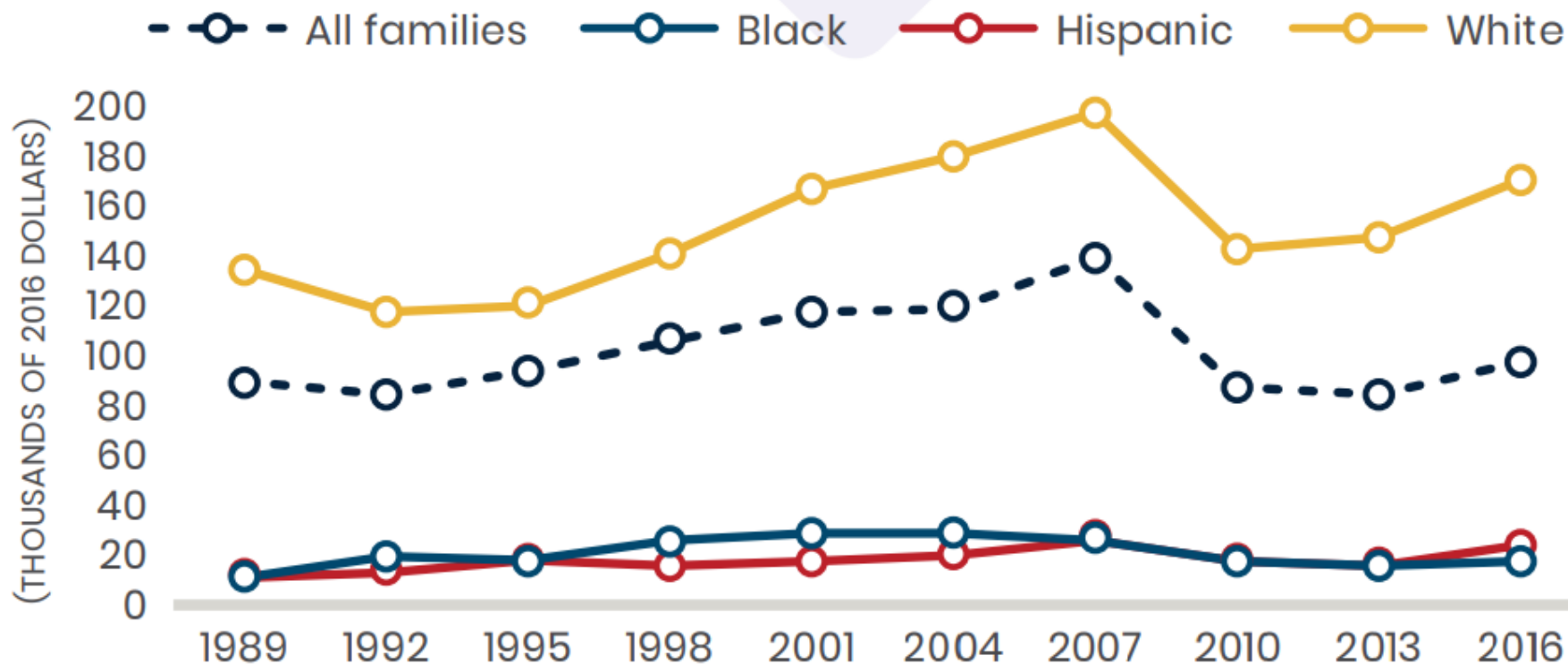

Median Net Worth by Race/Ethnicity, United States: 1989–2016



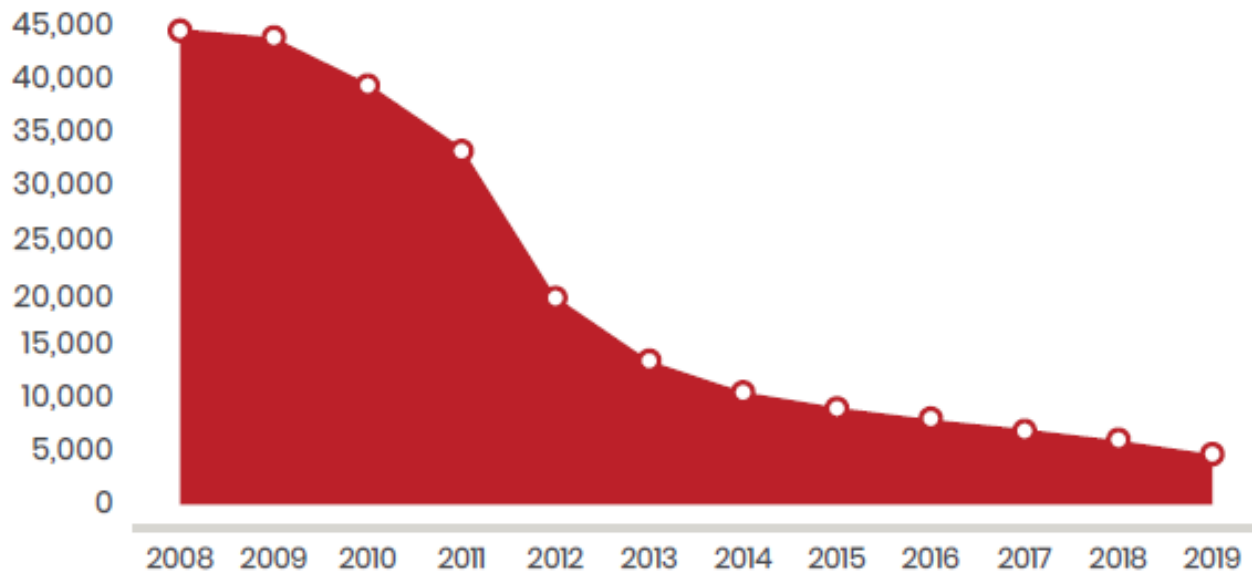

# Leveraging the Data: Informing Policy

## Sharing Data for SB 233 – TANF Eligibility

- The majority of Hoosiers who benefit from TANF cash assistance are children. Of the 18,662 TANF recipients in September 2020, 78.2% were children.
- Though our TANF rates are declining, we may not be meeting the need. It is estimate that for every 100 families living in poverty in Indiana, only 6 received TANF.

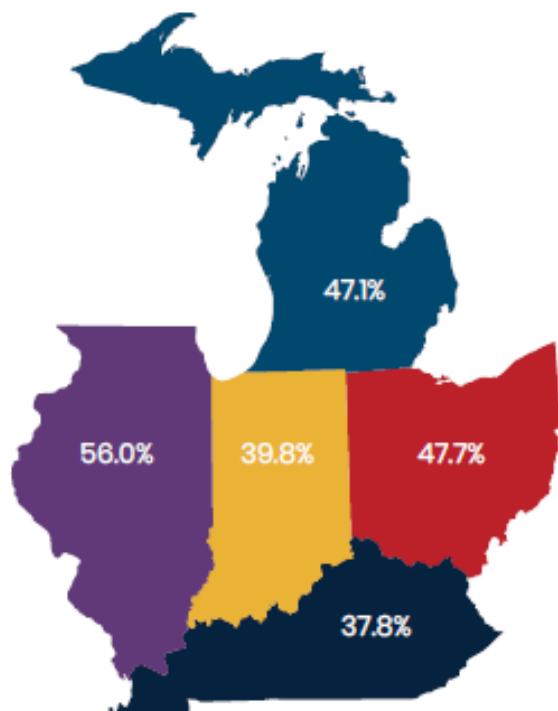

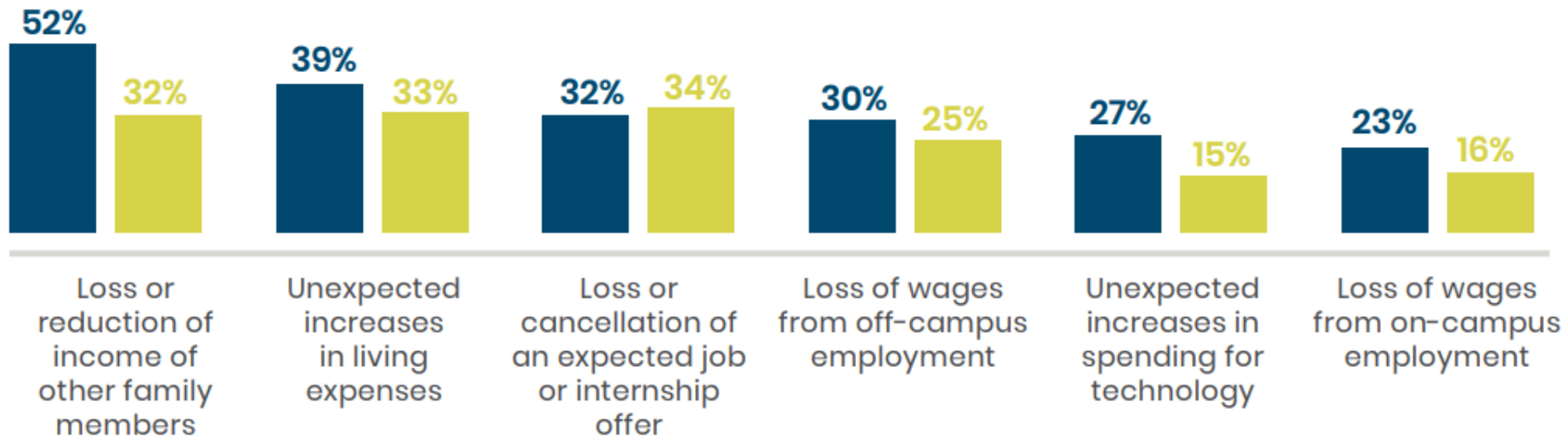

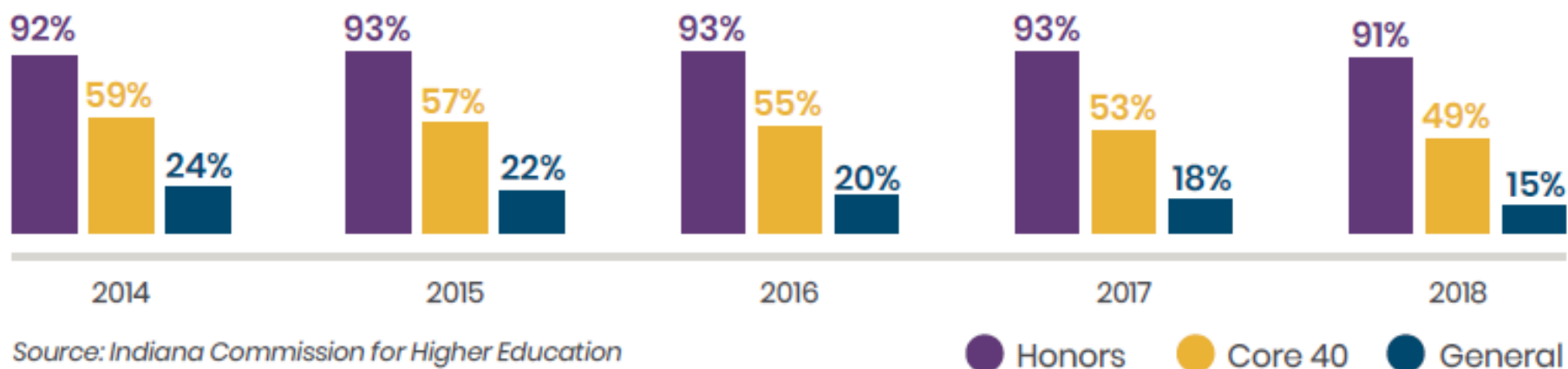

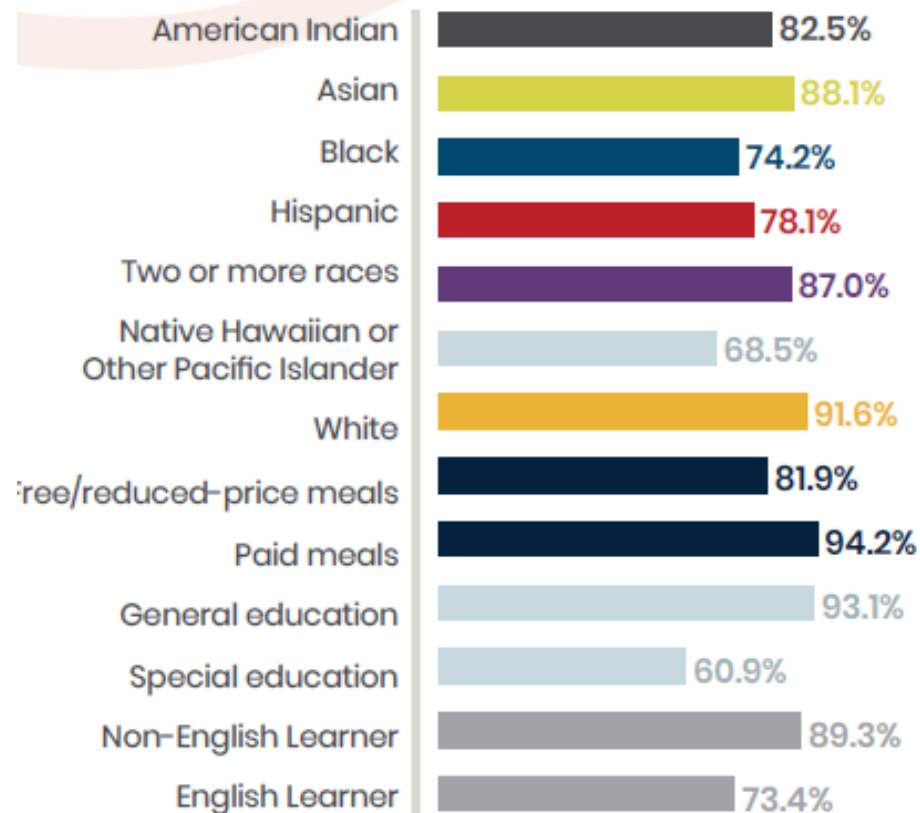

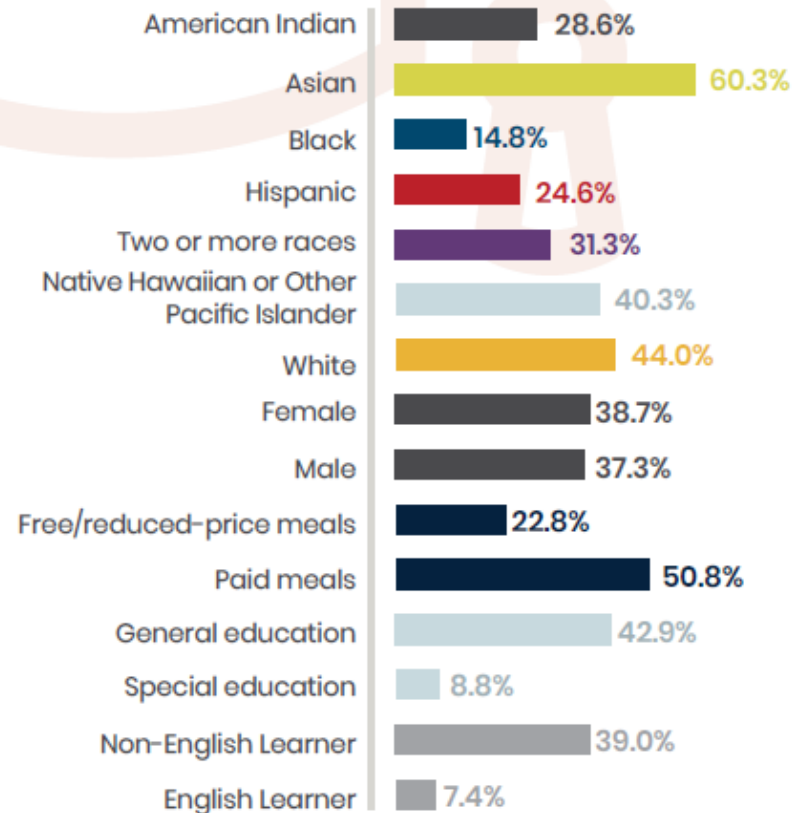

- Include impact stories that highlights key data points

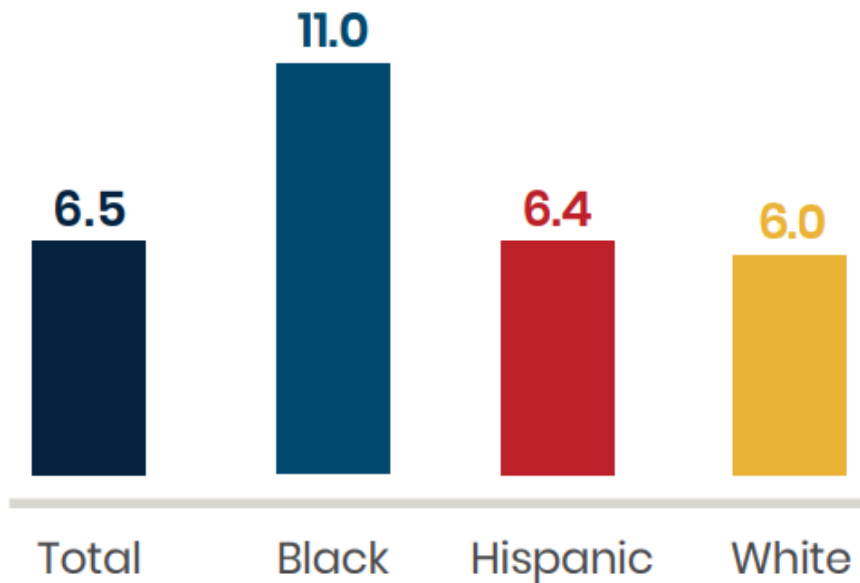

Ethnicity, Indiana: 2019



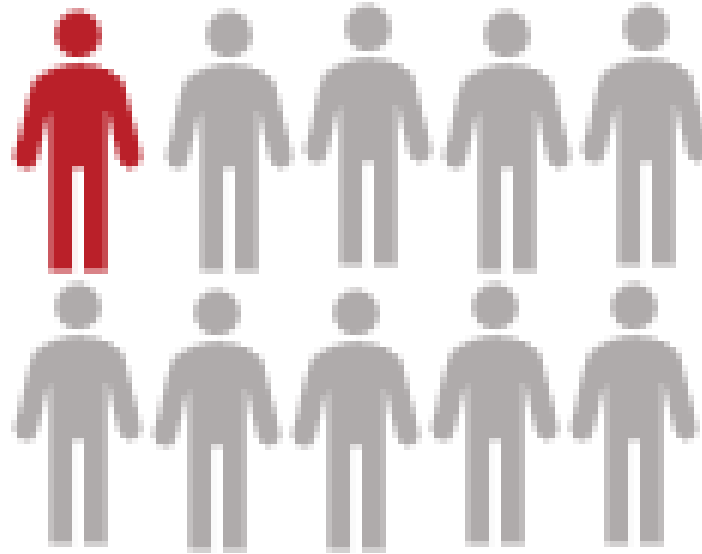

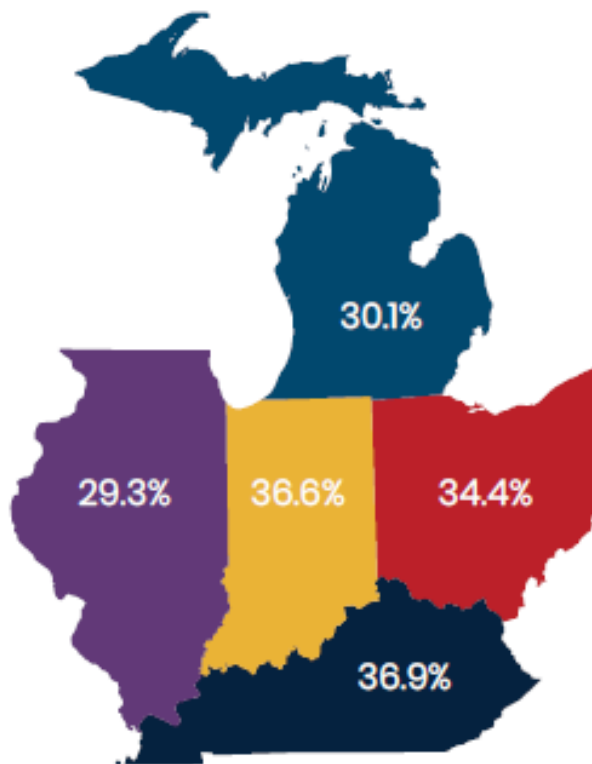

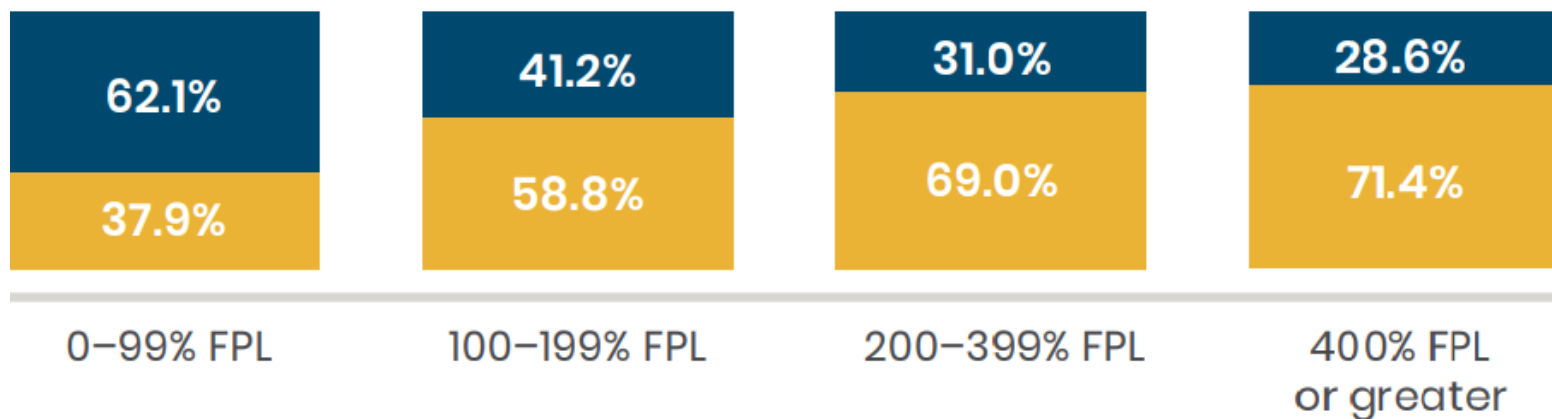

# Leveraging the Data: Advocacy

## Different types of advocacy:

- **Informational/Educational:** Purely educational in nature that does not does not advocate (expressly or implicitly) the adoption or rejection of legislation. This information can be available to the public, governmental bodies, officials, and employees.
- **Direct Lobbying:** Communication with a legislator (federal, state, local) or legislative staff member that aims to influence and/or express a view on specific legislation.
- **Grassroots Lobbying:** Communication with the general public that refers to specific legislation, expresses a view on that legislation, and urges the public to contact their legislator(s).

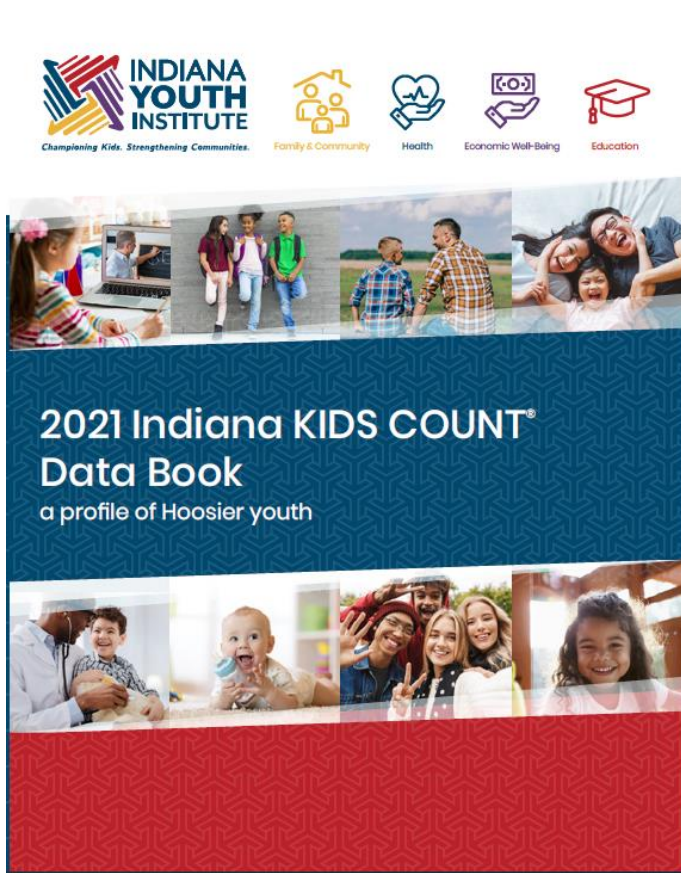
## Examples of Local-Level Advocacy:
